Articles from the Attic:

Silk Stockings Vitally Needed by Government

War Productions Board announced recently that thousands of silk and nylons stockings, now past the stage where they would be a credit to a lady's leg,

are exceedingly valuable to the Army and Navy for reclamation purposes. Believing that the woman of Seal Beach would like to cooperate in the nationwide drive for silk and nylon stockings, a receptacle has been placed in "Frosty" Felts store.

Stockings placed in this box will be sent where they will go into production. Please remember that only silk and nylon stockings are desired. They should be washed before turning them in.

At the processing plants the silks are separated

from the nylons by dipping them in a

chemical bath in which

where they dit to a the silks turn one color and the nylon another.

> Silk stockings are then sent to a reclaiming plant, where rayon and cotton feet, top and seems are cut off, and the remaining pure silk is spun into yarn and rewoven into powder bag cloth. The silk is particularly valuable as powder bag material because the silk burns instantly and leaves no ash residue in the guns.

Nylon stockings, after being separated out from the silk are processed in various ways, In one method, for instance, the nylon is melted down and the resulting liquid forced through tiny holes and solidified into thread, which is woven in tough durable material for war use.

Not even the cotton and rayon which may be removed from the stockings is wasted. With other rags, it is used in making products such as roofing.

The conservation division of the War Productions Board is directing the silk and nylon hosiery salvage campaign. Collection boxes already have been placed in most Southland retail stores hosiery departments.

There is no money involved in this stocking collection, no money to the woman who turn them in, no remuneration to the retailers who collect them. The campaign is purely voluntary and patriotic, but experience with present salvage drives indicated that Southern California women will not fail to respond with vigor and enthusiasm.
